Dance City Success!

The first weekend of term saw the whole school dance showcase at Dance City which was a roaring success with two sold out performances.

Over 120 performers from Year 6 to sixth form took part and showed true dedication in rehearsals in the lead up to the show. All four of our dance companies - Jeune, Mezzo, Vizavis and Rogue Boys - took part, alongside all those who attend dance clubs.

The overarching theme was 'a time in history', with dances based on the miners strike in the 80s, the suffragette movement, popular culture, the ice age, Lord of the Flies and the awful treatment in mental asylums - to name a few.

There was a range of music too, some were singalong tunes and others more contemporary.

Head of Dance at Dame Allan's and organiser of the event, Mrs Turnbull said:

STEAMing ahead at Dame Allan's

This term has seen a host of co-curricular activities related to **STEAM** subjects of **Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Maths**.

In December sixth formers visited Northumbria University for a Chemistry taster day to discover what university study would be like.


Francesca from Year 12 told us: 'It has definitely made me consider a future in chemistry, as the whole afternoon was a lot of fun and it showed me how versatile and valuable a degree in chemistry would be.' Denny, also from Year 12 was perhaps more honest about the challenge: 'We tried to make a fluorescent molecule, but our practicals didn't quite go to plan! Still, we got there in the end, and had fun in the process. It has certainly made me consider a chemistry or STEM related degree.'

We also hosted our Girls in Technology Conference for Year 9 where we welcomed Sage, Accenture and the NHS.

Each company gave a short presentation and pupils could visit stands to ask questions. We even had ex-pupil Joanne Larby return to give a speech on her career path to working at Accenture.

Year 9 pupil Emily told us she wants a career in technology, specifically Game Design which blends her two passions of art and video games.

The Year 9 boys got involved with STEM too with a workshop from engineer Mrs Lines. They were challenged to construct bridges out of paper which were then loaded with masses to see how much they could hold - the strongest managed to hold 4kg!



Musical success for pupils

It has been another successful half term for musicians across the Schools.

Ann Maria in Year 8 won first place in the parish guitar championship for the Indian Catholic Community of Great Britain which sent her through to the regional championships, coming second place. Then at the national championships she came third place overall! A great achievement which Ann Maria says 'was a good experience for performing and improving my musical abilities!'



Meanwhile, Matthew in Year 13 has secured an ARSM qualification for his piano playing. This performance-focused diploma is for learners beyond Grade 8 level and provides motivation, structure and feedback for developing musicians. Successful candidates can use the letters ARSM after their name to reflect their accomplishment.

Sports round up



It was a successful term for rugby with the boys U15 rugby team reaching the semi-final of the Natwest National Vase. They played a great game against Samuel Whitbread School in the quarter final and are now down to the final four of the 256 schools that entered the competition. Wishing our boys the best of luck in the semi-final in March which would take them to the grand final at Twickenham Stadium!



Our Junior School pupils have also been competing in rugby and hockey with their trip to Edinburgh this term. Year 6 enjoyed a sports tour to Edinburgh to play rugby and hockey with Loretto School, Stewart's Melville College and The Mary Erskine School. Our Year 5 boys saw off seven other independent schools to be crowned ISFA Northern Champions. They managed to win five and draw two games in the football tournament to finish top by one point. A fantastic team effort!

Our pupils are speeding ahead in cross-country too, with Jack from our U15 team finishing first at the TSSA Cross-Country event and becoming Tyneside Champion. Our U13 boys team did well too, finishing mid-table. Will, Zoe, Poppy, Annie, Ellie and Jack have all qualified to represent Northumberland in the Inter-Counties Championships next month too.

Our KS4 Squash team qualified for the National Plate Finals in Nottingham and our U16 Netball team reached the regional finals, coming a respectable 5th place. Year 10 Allannah has been selected for a regional pathway in Netball too.

We also launched our new Athlete Development Programme. Led by para-triathlete and geography teacher Mr Salisbury, the programme sees four elite athletes, who compete at a national level, share their expertise with other pupils.

England badminton champion Lucy, Sunderland RTC footballer Lillie, Newcastle Eagles Academy elite basketballer Nick, and talented polocrosse player Millie will guide and support younger pupils who are already playing higher-level sport, advising them on how to juggle training, matches and competitions with their studies and school life.



In conversation with... Amanda Howarth, Junior School Administrator.

Tell us about your role and the wider department.

The Junior School Office is one of the first points of contact for many of our parents and children so it is vitally important the administration team provide a warm, welcoming and professional environment. The team is currently made up of myself (School Administrator) and Sarah Fleck (School Secretary). The Junior School's Administration Department deals with many of the day to day enquiries that we receive from parents and staff so each day differs. As such, routine is mainly cast aside as each day can be very different to another.

What are your main responsibilities?

Our roles have a lot of contact with parents, pupils and Dame Allan's Senior School staff. We deal with enquiries, bookings, absences and greeting prospective parents, whilst also providing administrative support to the Head of the Junior School, teaching and support staff. Ultimately, it is our role to maintain the smooth running of the school office and all it encompasses.



Are there any challenges?

As with all roles there will always be challenges but as yet none that have not been overcome by accessing the knowledge and support of fellow members of staff and reaching a resolution. Adaptability is a crucial part of the role.

Have you always worked in the education sector?

I have worked in the manufacturing, legal and finance sectors, but I have been working in the education sector for many




Careers and Mentoring Programme

Safeguarding at Dame Allan's

This term it was Children's Mental Health Week from 6 - 10 February which saw a range of activities across the school. The theme, 'Let's Connect' focused on making meaningful connections in both the online and 'real' world. Our sixth form mentors visited form classes in Years 7-9 to deliver activities based around e-safety and mental health: pupils were asked to design collaborative postcards and write positive messages to one another. Pupils of all ages were encouraged to 'start conversations' about online activities as

part of Safer Internet Day on Tuesday 7 February and our Year 12 students fiercely debated the Online Safety Bill at Debating Club. Our FemSoc group looked at the historic stigma around women and mental health whilst the Year 12 Listening Skills group created an A-Z of mental health. Mrs Procter, Mrs Crawley and Mr Dobson educated the students on the importance of diet, sleep and exercise on 'Wellbeing Wednesday', whilst Mrs Joicey encouraged pupils to try a range of mindful activities in the library on 'Tranquil Tuesday'.

It was wonderful to see so many pupils talking positively about health and wellbeing so please continue these conversations at home. There are a number of useful resources for parents on the Place2Be site which are freely available.
